From our Mayor

Our district finished 2018 with some hugely encouraging news from Regional Development Minister Shane Jones, who announced \$25million of support from the Provincial Growth Fund for a range of Eastern Bay projects.

For all of us, who have long shared the confidence that Ōpōtiki has a very bright future based on marine industry, the announcement was a clear incentive for us to keep moving forward with our plans.

Council has worked hard to make sure the platform for development is in good shape through the district plan zoning processes and projects such as the sewer rehabilitation.

Our final meeting of 2018 saw Council take positive steps on another two key community projects – we listened to your feedback through the LTP process and are going ahead with the revitalisation of the Church Street Rose Garden into a significant playground facility which also acknowledges the site's history and meaning to local people. Council also determined to re-focus on a library redevelopment.

I hope residents were able to enjoy a holiday break with family and friends. It's been really neat to see the many visitors who have chosen to recreate in our district. When out and about, I noticed many who were traditional holiday-makers with connections to Ōpōtiki, as well as others who were discovering our corner of paradise for the first time – all enjoying our attractions and hospitality.

Our events team again delivered, or supported, an action-packed Summer Festival to entertain locals and visitors alike.

Over 500 enjoyed the Transpower Gourmet Food Market and Movie Night at the end of December, making the most of the live music, and taste sensations offered by the food trucks – everything from locally-produced honey (drizzled on crepes) to berries, rolls and sushi.

Building consent process improvements

Over the past few months we have been working hard to improve systems within Council's building service, which has been under significant strain due to a record number of building consent applications received and processed.

Our strategy for improvement has included:

- **Online application**
Building consent applications can now be submitted, managed and tracked from anywhere, at any time through our online service page.
- **Call back and appointment request online**
You can now submit call back and appointment requests online
- **We've added more resource and communication**
An additional staff member has joined the team to process consents; and we have called in additional support for site inspections to get us over the spike. We're also checking in with building contractors to let them know about the changes and to get their feedback on potential areas of further improvement.



Library updates important collection



New titles across a wide genre have been introduced – from contemporary fiction to classics and non-fiction. Don't assume large print books are only for those with eye-sight issues – just think how handy a larger font size could be when you're reading in a summer holiday tent and your camper's headlight isn't quite up to the job.

Get your DVDs here

Across the country, public libraries are taking up the space in the market created by the closure of DVD stores – and Ōpōtiki District Library is no exception.

Call in – you'll be impressed with the range of titles available for loan at a very affordable weekly rate. You're also encouraged to use the 'request an item' link on the library webpage so that the collection can be built to reflect user interest.

Do you want to be alerted to all that's going on in your neighbourhood and beyond?

Download Antenno, our free mobile app that sends you notifications and alerts about places you care about - things like community events, changes to rubbish collections, road works and more.

Antenno is free to download and use; you can opt out of topics that aren't of interest to you. It doesn't ask for any personal information or login details, so it's a nice easy way to stay informed.

Antenno makes it easy for you to submit feedback or report issues such as a damaged footpath, road pothole, graffiti or to submit feedback or an idea to Council.

Rapid Numbers

Residents, who have been notified of the need for a new rapid number for their property, are reminded to complete the simple on-line form (or call Council) to receive their free address number decal.

Food Act compliance

Our regulatory group is pleased to report that local businesses are showing increasingly better compliance with meeting the requirements of the Food Act. Keep up the good work.

Parking on a pavement? Expect a fine.

Council has responded to community concerns about inconsiderate motorists parking on pavements or in spaces reserved for mobility-card holders. A policy has been introduced which will see infringement notices issued for parking in inappropriate places. Around ten people have so far been issued notices and some of the vehicles concerned also received infringements for no WOF or registration, making the decision to park on a footpath a costly one.
