### **End of an era**

As the current triennium ends, Council says goodbye to a number of long standing councillors.

Councillor Ken Young has served the Waioeka/ Waiōtahe ward since 2013 and has long been an advocate for community spaces, parks and reserves and making sure that community assets would be available for future generations.

Councillor Arihia Tuoro has represented the Ōpōtiki ward for the past six years and has been an advocate for many community programmes in that time – from correct spelling of the town and district to the driver licencing programme.

We also say goodbye to Ōpōtiki's long standing Mayor, John Forbes who has served the community since 1986 as councillor and mayor. He has represented Ōpōtiki on a local and international stage and he has held more positions on national bodies than we can count. His passion for the district and his hard work have given this town a legacy that we will appreciate for many generations to come.





Voting closed on 12 October 2019 and we hope everyone took the opportunity to vote in this year's local elections.

In the coming days (no later than 23 October) we will have final results in and know who will be representing Ōpōtiki residents for the coming three years as Ōpōtiki mayor and councillors, Coast Community Board members, Bay of Plenty Regional Council councillors and Bay of Plenty District Health Board members.

The Inaugural meeting will be held on 31 October 2019 and councillors and the mayor will be sworn in. The first normal meeting of council will then occur on 12 November 2019 and regular monthly meetings will follow for the coming three years.

# Ōpōtiki's **Ⅲ** Iibrary upgrade

Ōpōtiki has been discussing the future of the public library for more than 10 years. The current temporary premises are not fit for purpose and are a short-term lease option. The previous library premises on the corner of King and Church streets have severe issues with a leaking roof and black mould. It is also too small for the wide range of services the library provides.

For many years, the community has fundraised for the new library building and has raised almost \$1million towards the rebuild. However, we have not been successful in raising sufficient funding from other external sources to get close to the build cost and the project had stalled.

Council went back to the community and asked whether we should continue with the project with funding via a loan. The feedback from more than 260 submissions collected in July and August showed a large majority wanted to go ahead with the project.

Accordingly, Council voted to go ahead with building Te Tāhuhu o Te Rangi Technology and Research Centre funded with a \$3.25 million loan. This decision factored in the advantages of owning all the land on the larger redevelopment site (and no longer having to pay rent on the current temporary premises), likely income from the Mechanic's Institute deed, likely additional funding through other sources such as BayTrust, a safer, purpose-built facility that meets current earthquake standards, a significant community asset with benefits for future generations.







# Earthquake-prone buildings in the town centre

Changes in national legislation mean that some building owners in the  $\bar{O}$ pōtiki district will need to have their buildings assessed and seismic strengthening work carried out in the coming seven years.

There is a lot of work to do to ensure that <code>Opotiki</code> is meeting these legislative timeframes. In the past months, Council has consulted with the community on thoroughfares with high pedestrian and vehicle traffic and worked with organisations that own buildings used for emergency management and education purposes.

Council is also working to identify 'priority buildings' in the district and will be sending letters to building owners by 1 January 2020 requesting that a structural engineer undertakes an initial assessment of the building.

## **Harbour Development**

The last few months have been an exceedingly busy time on the Harbour Project as we finalised our business plan and application to the Provincial Growth Fund for the build of Ōpōtiki's harbour entrance.

These twin seawalls will provide a year-round navigable harbour entrance to be used by a wide range

of craft with a strong focus on servicing the growing mussel industry right on our doorstep. This will allow fresh produce straight to the planned processing factory here in Ōpōtiki.

Our business case will be reviewed by the PGF and then sent to Cabinet for final consideration. While there are no set timeframes, we hope to hear back before the end of the year.

### **Town Centre Revitalisation**

What things do you love about the current town centre? What things do you think need to change? How can we best tell the 'story of Ōpōtiki' through our architecture and streetscape? How can we make the town centre a bustling place where we want to spend time?

Council is currently asking for feedback on how we revitalise our town centre. We are out and about on the streets, speaking at service group meetings, chatting with individuals and groups who want to know more and holding formal and informal catch-ups to hear from as many people as possible.

The next step will be to use this feedback to inform a Structure Plan and Design Guidelines which will be available for further thoughts and feedback early in 2020.

# Changes to rubbish and recycling collection in Ōpōtiki township

Several areas in Ōpōtiki's urban collection area have received a flyer letting them know that their rubbish collection day has changed.

For all properties east of the Waioeka bridge, there is no change to rubbish and recycling pick up. However, if you have a property west of the Waioeka Bridge, you will have received a notification about the change of rubbish days to Wednesday. All rubbish and the correct recycling crates need to be out by 8am on Wednesdays.




This is because advice from Worksafe NZ is that our contractors should not work on both sides of the road at the same time due to the risks for collectors moving into oncoming traffic. So to allow our contractors sufficient time to work safely and continue to provide a high level of service, we will spread the collection over two days.
