It is also a chance to acknowledge the year that has past. Last year was another big year for the district and for the Council. I acknowledge the tragedy on Whakaari / White Island that

marked a sad end to 2019 last month. We also farewelled many friends and family, 'community kaumātua' who have contributed so much to their communities through acts of service big and small.

But it was also a year of progress. We have pressed go on the rebuild of our library and community hub and you will start to see activity on the old library site (on the corner of King and Church streets) soon.

We submitted our business case to government for funding of the harbour development. We have seen our sister project, Whakatōhea's mussel farm and factory, going ahead in leaps and bounds and we eagerly await a decision from Cabinet in the coming weeks.

It has been fantastic to see the community come together in recent times and some great new initiatives. I will continue to work with agencies across the board, NZTA, BOPDHB, NZ Police, schools, central and local government for the best outcomes for our communities.

Several big projects are going very well - our sewer rehabilitation project is on track and below budget and we are already seeing benefits with fewer overflows and better service. The stormwater project will add to those benefits and ensure a healthier and less flood-prone township.

To both locals and visitors, please continue to enjoy our little corner of paradise, travel safe and keep well. All the best for an outstanding 2020.

In brief...

Every three years, Council commissions an independent *Customer Satisfaction Survey* of Ōpōtiki residents to check how we are going in a few key areas. If



you receive a phone call from the survey company, we'd appreciate your time and honest feedback. While you cannot opt-in to do the survey (it must be a random selection of people), if you have any feedback for Council, you are always welcome to fill in the feedback form on the website directly.

Download the free mobile app, *Antenno*, to receive notifications and alerts about places you care about – things like community events, changes to rubbish collections, road works



and more. Antenno also makes it easy for you to submit feedback or report issues such as a damaged footpath, road pothole, graffiti or to submit feedback or an idea to Council. So if your phone is never far out of your reach, neither is Council!

On 30 and 31 January, we will be holding our *annual community open days*.

These pop-up shops are always popular and a chance to see what council is up to, chat to staff and provide feedback. This year you can find out more about how to Be Prepared in an emergency, find out about current engineering activities, talk to your councillors, the next steps for Te Tahuhu o Te Rangi and plenty more to find out about.




Opotiki District will officially become Ōpōtiki District on 17 January 2020 following a request we put in to the New Zealand Geographic Board last year. The spelling with macrons is now OFFICIAL and matches the town name changed in 2018 and all the many places we use the macronised spelling. The name now reflects the pronunciation in Te Reo Māori and the history of tipuna Tarawa who released his pet tanahanaha (fish) into a spring that became known as 'Ōpōtiki-Mai-Tawhiti' meaning 'the pets from afar'.



With thanks to Kōtui and the Department of Internal Affairs, Ōpōtiki Library now has a *new mobile app* that can be downloaded onto your phone. It is a really neat tool to help navigate the library's catalogues and collections and to manage your own library account – renew, reserve and even borrow eAudio and eBooks without leaving your deck chair! You can find it in the Apple App Store and Google Playstore.

We had some great feedback on our *Town Centre*Revitalisation project last year. People shared their thoughts on how we want the town centre to look and feel and how it can reflect our shared histories. We expect to be able to share a draft Structure Plan and Design Guidelines shortly and there will be another opportunity to give feedback before those documents are finalised.



Changes in national legislation mean that some building owners in the Ōpōtiki district will need to have their buildings assessed



and seismic strengthening work carried out in the coming seven years. If your building has been identified as a 'priority building' under *Earthquake-prone buildings legislation*, you will have received a letter from Council outlining next steps. We encourage you to take some time to read more about the legislation and what it may mean for you. The Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment website has some excellent information and if you want to know more, you can also speak to Council's Policy Planner on 07 315 3030.

Following a very successful 2019 *Arts on Tour* year, planning is already well underway to bring even more quality performances to Ōpōtiki in 2020.
